abolitionist projects, stop the sweeps, mutual aid projects (shout out to free food Wednesdays at Cal Anderson!), and many others I'm probably not remembering off the top of my head or don't yet know about. We've also hosted benefit shows to raise funds for various causes (the person reading this probably found out about a couple from reading Sabotage Noise), and hold author events and open mic nights at the store. The crew at left bank is always busy outside of their work stocking shelves to take part in all of these projects, and are more than willing to introduce these projects to others who also show a genuine interest in building and supporting local community.

One thing we've seen that sets Left Bank apart from most bookstores is its long-running support for incarcerated readers. Can you tell us a little about this important work?

Books to prisoners (BTP) began as a project of Left Bank Books around the same time of its founding in the 1970's (you can read more about that on the website bookstoprisoners.net). While prisons are usually outfitted with libraries for prisoners to use, many of them are underfunded or lack access to the same reading materials that many of us take for granted. BTP is meant to fill that gap for prisoners by sending all sorts of reading materials, though there are certainly barriers to getting prisoners the things they want to read.

The requirements for books vary greatly from state to state, but Left Bank (the physical store) does offer a selection of books available for people to buy and donate to BTP, and we're always trying to keep that selection stocked with titles that fit the criteria to allow them to get to prisoners who request them. We also usually have a cart in front of the shop full of books people can buy for \$1 that help pay for postage to help BTP.

I highly recommend reading the website for more information about the project and to also read up more about the ever increasing censorship in prisons. There's also links to lists of requirements for book donations if you're interested in sending something to a prisoner that we might not carry in the store!

What advice would you have for people looking to start a project inspired by Left Bank?


Communicate. While you can, theoretically, "do whatever you want forever," you need to be able to communicate your intentions to the rest of your group/collective to avoid any potential issues that might arise before an action is carried out. That is, if you want your project to remain operational in the long run.

Since Left Bank is "worker controlled," all the behind-the-scenes "business" responsibilities are placed on the collective members. This includes ordering books, pay-roll, business licensing and taxes, all that annoying shit. If someone in the collective just decided to start doing one of their responsibilities differently or not doing it at all and didn't inform others, it would have a major impact on the ways the other collective members are able to carry out their responsibilities. Effective communication is a way to keep the project going as long as it needs to.

Where can people find y'all, digitally and in-real-life?

You can check out the store's website at leftbankbooks.com or, if you use social media, Instagram @leftbankbookcollective. The physical store is located in Pike Place Market, near the corner of Pike st. and 1st ave, but we also table at various book fairs and events that occur around the Salish Sea.

You can find the people that make up Left Bank out and about a Seattle, most likely dumpster diving.



Sabotage Noise spoke with the lovely folks of Left Bank Books, a rad Seattle bookstore:

Left Bank Books just had its 50th Anniversary! Could you share a quick story or two from that long history that gives people a sense of why the store is so (in)famous?

The Left Bank Archive actually made a really cool zine about the history of the store if you're interested in a more in-depth history!

Basically, Left Bank was an anarchist offshoot of a marxist-socialist bookstore called the Red and Black Bookstore during the cold war, so already it would have been considered "infamous" by the state and put under direct surveillance due to its involvement with anarchist and other radical movements at the time. However, Left Bank has been one of only a handful of projects that has continuously been distributing anarchist and radical literature since its inception, with many former collective members eventually branching off into their own radical literature projects.

Can you give us a few quick book recs that exemplify the type of books Left Bank specializes in?

We might not carry it anymore (the distro we got it from closed down), but Desert by anonymous was one of the books (essays?) that introduced me to anarchist thought, along with Expect Resistance by Crimethinc. We have plenty more amazing books, but these were the first ones I found on the shelves there before I started volunteering

that really continued bringing me into the store and influenced me to take a bigger part in mutual aid and organizing within my community.

How do y'all support building local community outside selling or donating books? A lot of us take part in various projects outside of the store, such as Cont. on back
